Share this valuable information about AAUW's significant and outstanding Fellowships and Grants with others. Guidelines and applications are available online at <u>www.aauw.org</u>. Direct application questions to <u>aauw@scholarshipamerica.org</u> or call 319-688-4334.

- AAUW Career Development Grants (\$2,000-\$12,000, deadline December 15, 2015) to support women pursuing a certificate or degree to advance their careers, change careers, or re-enter the workforce and whose bachelor's degree was received at least five years before award period.
- AAUW Selected Professions Fellowships (\$5,000-\$18,000, deadline: January 10, 2016) to support women pursing full-time study in a master's or professional degree program in which women are underrepresented, including STEM, law, business and medicine.
- AAUW Community Action Grants (One-year, \$2,000-\$7,000 and two-year, grant, \$5,000-\$10,000, deadline January 15, 2016) to support individuals, AAUW branches/states, and nonprofit organizations to fund innovative programs or non-degree research projects that promote education and equity for women and girls.

#### Lisa Maatz, AAUW's Vice President of Government Relations visited Kansas

On September 26, Lisa Maatz came to Wichita for a conversation about Strengthening and Enhancing your Organization: Tools and Strategies for a Stronger Policy Advocate. Women

from Wichita, Newton Area, El Dorado and Manhattan Branches attended.

As AAUW's top policy adviser, Lisa works to advance AAUW's priority issues on Capitol Hill, in the White House, and in collaboration with other organizations.

Lisa invited us to get engaged and active in Public Policy:

• If you care about public policy issues use the *Two-Minute Activist* on the aauw.org website, collaborate with other like-minded organizations, sign up for the *ActionNetwork*, VOTE and help get out the vote.

• AAUW needs our help to get the bipartisan Hold Accountable and Lend Transparency (HALT) on Campus Sexual Violence Act passed. About 28 percent of college women are targets of attempted or completed sexual assault. AAUW's own research revealed that two-thirds of college students experience sexual harassment. Call all your Kansas Congressional leaders to vote for this bill to help make campuses in Kansas safer for women. Congresswoman Lynn Jenkins has a sensibility about women's issues and should be contacted.

We thank Lisa for visiting Kansas and a special thanks to all involved in making her visit a great visit.

Greetings to AAUW Kansas! I recently joined the State board as Public Policy Chair and am a member of the Newton Area Branch. As I begin learning the resources and opportunities involved with this new role, I have been studying the National Public Policy details available on the National AAUW website. AAUW and its members have a long history of speaking out about national, state and local policies and legislation important to women and girls.

The National AAUW Public Policy Program was reviewed and adopted in June 2015 and is available to inform our advocacy efforts. A key element of the policy program is opposition to "all forms of discrimination and supports constitutional protection for the civil rights of all individuals". I encourage you to read the document in its entirety as it reminds one of the scope of AAUW and the reasons we belong to AAUW:

- Support of a strong system of public education
- Economic equity and fairness for all women
- Guarantees of equality, individual rights, and social justice for all

You can stay informed and also take action on important policy issues by signing up to be an **AAUW Two-Minute Activist** which allows you to easily support AAUW's policy actions – in just 2 minutes!!. You can also continue writing letters and making phone calls to local, state and national legislators as well as the President of the United States.

#### Highlights of the 2015 AAUW National Convention

Like most of the 1,050 participants at the AAUW National Convention, June 18-21, 2015 in sunny San Diego, the Kansas AAUW members Nancy Bolsen, Teresa Sullivan, Carolyn Dwire, Eileen Armstrong, Tresa Landis, and Barbara Gatewood took learning and networking seriously! The conference offered an impressive array of speakers and panelists, 30 workshops, plus pre-con activities, such as the one-day conference for state presidents, attended by Nancy Bolsen.

Opening Speaker, **Catherine Lhamon**, Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights, U.S. Department of Education (USDE), gave an impressive talk on civil rights, Title IX, and how the law helps fight sexual assault. She stressed that more information is needed about the law, how to file a lawsuit, and how USDE can help. Other **major topics** addressed were attracting women to STEM fields, educating the homeless

and under- privileged, \$tart \$mart/Work Smart, building women leaders, how to encourage more women to run for elected offices, the international women's movement promoted by the United Nations (UN) and AAUW, diversity and inclusion, expanding public policy, marketing/recruiting /retention strategies, technology's role in branch growth, maintaining branch archives, fundraising, and a wealth of information on successful branch program ideas. WOW! We couldn't help feel proud that many of our state branches include some of these major topics as ongoing branch programs.

AAUW's Vice President of Government Relations, Lisa Maatz discussed the use of social media, email and other online tools to be an activist for social change. AAUW is expanding its public policy efforts on the state and local levels. Melissa Guardaro, AAUW's UN Representative provided valuable insight on what AAUW is doing at the UN level and the U.S.'s global impact on achieving equality for women. AAUW has a long history of tackling

global women's issues, from giving out fellowships to international scholars to working with the UN.

One of the highlights of the convention was the session "What Does It Take to Make a Woman Leader." The panel included Don McPherson; Lilly Ledbetter, Fair Pay Advocate; **Noorjahan Akbar**; journalist Marianne Schnall; and Kate Farrar, AAUW Campus Leadership Programs. We are very excited that Noorjahan has accepted the Manhattan Branch's invitation to present a program on **March 8, 2016, International Women's Day** that will be open to K-State, all AAUW members, and the general public. As a leader in Afghanistan, Noorjahan has steered several human rights campaigns, authored activism literature, and co-founded <u>Young</u> <u>Women for Change</u>, which focuses on fighting for gender equality and rights for Afghani women. In 2012 she received AAUW-NCCWSL Women of Distinction Award.

There were many

opportunities for socializing, enjoying entertainment, and making new AAUW friends. A local scouting troop opened the convention with the singing of the Star-Spangled Banner, which generated much enthusiasm. A talented women's mariachi band escorted the participants into the convention banquet. The exhibition hall contained a special exhibit and book on



<u>Trailblazers in Women's Surfing</u>, which inspired the convention theme *Riding the Wave*.

#### A Note from Linda Hallman, CEO of AAUW

Not enough women have careers in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math). Women make up a disappointing 12% of working engineers and account for just 26% of computing professionals — a substantially smaller portion than 30 years ago and about the same percentage as in 1960.

AAUW is helping girls across the country break through the barriers that stand in their way, so that they can pursue satisfying, exciting, and rewarding careers in high-paying STEM fields that have been so disproportionately dominated by men.

We must give every girl who has ever dreamed of becoming an astronaut, computer scientist, engineer, industrial designer, or mathematician the chance to fulfill her goals. And that's what we are doing through our STEM programs, AAUW National Tech Savvy and Tech Trek!

Tech Savvy is a daylong, hands-on STEM conference held around the nation for middle school girls and their parents. Participants attend workshops on subjects such as paleontology, chemical engineering, and robotics. Each Tech Savvy program site also includes sessions for parents, giving them the facts and encouragement they need to reinforce and support their daughter's engagement in STEM.
