# Message from Kristina:

It has been heartbreaking to look at my calendar and see all of the events canceled this spring. Even though it is safest to stay home and not congregate together, I miss my local AAUW branch and I was so disappointed to cancel our annual state conference. Every March, my local branch meets at the home of one of our members to discuss a book we picked to read together at our December meeting. Since we couldn't meet together this year our host began our book discussion by sending out discussion questions via email. Each member chimed in with her answers, replying to all. It wasn't the same as sitting around the living room, drinking coffee, and lively debating the merits of the book, but it was connecting with each other. Now more than ever, communicating with our friends is important. While we cannot gather in one place for branch meetings, we can get together in creative ways. Here is a list of ideas to keep you connected with your branches and with each other across the state.

> Utilize email: work to create an up-to-date email list of all branch members and send out emails, either individual or groups to stay in contact with one another.

- Host a Zoom meeting: Zoom.us is a free video and audio service that allows a meeting host to facilitate a gathering for 40 minutes at a time. Sign up is free, although for a fee you can host meetings for longer than 40 minutes. Zoom works on your smartphone or computer. I've been on Zoom calls this month for a virtual birthday party, a state AAUW presidents meeting, national AAUW calls, and virtual happy hours.
- Activate the phone tree: If you are more comfortable on the phone than on the computer, please work to get an up-to-date telephone number list. Divide your list into groups among your branch officers and make a plan to contact each member every week/two weeks/etc.

Although it's not as instantaneous, the post office is still working and could use the funds. Send a letter or quick note to someone from AAUW and let them know you are thinking about them. Whatever method of communication you choose, please check in with each other. Especially keep an eye on our members who live alone.

National AAUW is also working hard to keep everyone connected. Be sure to check your email for national communication and check out the new AAUW website for more ways to stay involved. We are staying home but our advocacy for AAUW legislation remains vital. There is plenty of work to be done for equal rights, equal pay, and equal access to education. If you have the time to get involved, now is a perfect opportunity to flood our elected officials email boxes with our concerns and AAUW opportunities.
