## From the President's Desk

### A Meaningful 2023 Conference

I was re-energized by the Kansas AAUW Annual Meeting, *Being Native/Being Kansan*! Manhattan graciously hosted us, our presenters were personable and informative, and a number of new faces joined the crowd. We also had a mildly chaotic but fruitful state board election; two brand new board members were elected (Ruth Mbah and Andrea Ring - additional details later in this newsletter) and Linda Ball became President-Elect. AAUW of Kansas might have our struggles, but we aren't done yet! We can continue to work together to support women in our communities, state, and nation.

Melinda Williamson, member of the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation and founder of Morning Light Kombucha, spoke on "From Academia to Entrepreneurship: An Indigenous Woman's Journey." Kombucha is a fermented (probiotic) tea and Melinda's business started in an effort to take care of her health after an autoimmune disease diagnosis. Melinda shared about her family's history of entrepreneurship and her journey to business ownership. Morning Light Kombucha now employs six people and donates 10% of sales to support Native American causes. I learned that the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation is one of four federally-recognized tribes in Kansas. Their Nation originates in the Great Lakes region and was forcibly relocated to Kansas.

Audrey Swartz spoke on "Being Indigenous in the Now: How Modern Natives are Combating the Past Tense." She is a librarian at the Manhattan Public Library. She is part of the Miami Nation, also a Great Lakes region tribe that was forcibly moved to Kansas (put on boats at gunpoint), and then again to Oklahoma. She traced her personal family heritage with the Miami tribe, shared about traumas indigenous people have faced and continue to face (forced relocation, sexual assault, domestic violence), and also talked about initiatives to preserve indigenous culture and language, as well as efforts like removing mascots that promote racist stereotypes. Audrey has since announced that she is running for election to the Manhattan USD 383 school board. Her platform includes greater access to mental health services and removing the district's "Indians" mascot.

both wore ribbon skirts. This was an opportunity
for us to learn about traditional clothing. Ribbon
skirts are made from fabric with ribbons sewn
horizontally around the skirt and are often worn
for special occasions. The color of the ribbons can
have special meaning to the wearer. Ribbon skirts
symbolize indigenous pride, culture, strength, and

- I strongly encourage all of us to put our mission - To advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy - at the forefront of our programming and initiatives.
- We have all heard civic participation is declining. However, I think there are many women who have never been invited to step into volunteer leadership in organizations like AAUW, and who have new ideas and initiatives. Who has never been invited to the table in your communities and how can they be welcomed? I speak from experience in saying leadership in AAUW is a wonderful learning opportunity and can be foundational in teaching skills that can be used through a woman's career.
- Instead of focusing on our membership challenges, I encourage us to enjoy the time we have now, the fascinating people who comprise our organization, and to try to make a meaningful impact for women and girls in 2023-24.
- Let's also keep in mind the wonderful programs that AAUW has to offer: First of all, AAUW continues its many educational grants, most of which have deadlines in fall/early winter. AAUW just launched a financial literacy workshop, Money Smart, and the Work Smart salary negotiation web training is still available online. STEMEd for Girls is back. The National Conference for College Women Student Leaders (NCCWSL) is another opportunity to support young women's advancement. Let's spread the word on these impactful opportunities!

### **Kansas Suffrage Memorial Update**

Kansas Suffrage Memorial Committee has been working this spring. The first step to invite artists to create proposals was to send out a Request for Qualifications. About 20 artists sent their qualifications and photos of their work to the committee. After assessing these resumes and visions, the committee selected 6 artists to submit proposals to fit one of two spaces in the Capitol as designated by the Capitol Preservation Committee. These artists have accepted the invites and now have until September to submit their proposals.

Fundraising for this Kansas Suffrage memorial is now the next step. As a partner in this great project AAUW Kansas has committed to aid in fund raising. The easiest path to donate is to go to the <a href="kssuffragist.org">kssuffragist.org</a> website. On that site, print the form then mail it to the address on the form. And you can send a check or donate by way of submitting your credit card information and then send to the Department of Administration Kansas Suffrage Memorial Fund. All the details are on the form. In addition to the form, you can also select the level of donation.

Your dollars go directly to the memorial fund which will pay the artist and the actual creation for the capitol site. We will need our AAUW Kansas members/branches to complete this great addition to our Kansas Capitol. As the committee states, "It is our wish that this public art inspire and educate people about Kansas women suffragists to pass our values to present and future ." Please consider all kinds of fundraising plans in your communities to get this memorial done. Kansas suffragists were creative, bold, and challenged the status quo to be among the first to vote! I can see tea parties to champaign breakfasts to ....well what is your creative idea to build the Kansas Suffrage Memorial?
